Brief History of Rock Island Station

The Rock Island line was a passenger line that carried passengers to Jacksboro, Bridgeport, Fort Worth, as far as Galveston and North to Waurika, Oklahoma. The rail line was a result of the oil boom taking place in our area, as it was a way to transport workers to the fields. It was also a popular passenger train, and many would take day trips as an event for the family. A new union station was built in 1923 and is still standing. It has been renovated by community citizens and is where The Rock, a local student ministry, now calls home.

It was a combination of the Great Depression and construction of new roads into Jack and Young Counties that put an end to the railroad. The last passenger train ran in 1933, while the last Mixed Train ran in 1953.
